DELINE FIRST NATION BAND DELINE LAND CORPORATION

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS the negotiators for the Deline First Nation Band, the Deline Land Corporation, Canada and the Government of the Northwest Territories have reached agreement on the Deline Final Self-Government Agreement.

AND WHEREAS the Deline Final Self-Government Agreement is intended to become a treaty protected by the Constitution of Canada and it must be submitted for a Ratification Vote by the Deline First Nation Band and the Deline Land Corporation.

AND WHEREAS the Ratification Vote of the members of the Deline First Nation Band and the Deline Land Corporation is scheduled to be held in March 2014.

AND WHEREAS it is also provided in the Deline Final Self-Government Agreement that a Constitution setting out the principles for the Deline Got'ine Government be approved by the members of the Deline First Nation Band and the members of the Deline Land Corporation on or before the date of the Ratification Vote.

AND WHEREAS a draft Constitution has now been prepared and is attached to this motion;

NOW THEREFORE IT IS AGREED:

- 1. The Chief Negotiator for Deline be authorized to initial the Deline Final Self-Government Agreement and related agreements to be submitted to the members in the Ratification Vote.
- 2. The draft Constitution be submitted to a special Joint Assembly of Deline Land Corporation and the Deline First Nation Band for discussion and approval to be held on January , 2014.
- 3. A copy of the Constitution as approved be provided to voters on the Ratification Voters List for information.

DÉLÎNÊ FIRST NATION CONSTITUTION (DÉLÎNÊ GOT'ÎNÊ ÆÆDÓ)

Preamble

We are the *Sahtuto'ine*, known as the Bear Lake People. We are the descendants of the prophet *Eht'se Aya*. We have lived on our land since time immemorial, long before the arrival of Europeans. For all this time our land has been called Délînê and we have been called the *Sahtuto'ine*.

Great Bear Lake and our traditional territories have sustained us physically, culturally, and spiritually for thousands of years. We are part of the land and it is part of us; we fish, hunt and trap, just as our forebears did. We depend on the fish and the caribou and other wildlife.

Our history and knowledge exists in the stories of the places and routes where our people have lived and travelled since time immemorial, where we continue to live and travel.

The Creator has given us responsibility to care for and live in harmony with the lands, waters, animals, and all life that is here, which is the basis of our language, culture and traditions, and which gives us life.

We respect the wisdom of our ancestors, their knowledge and teachings.

We respect the Dene Laws.

The Creator sent Yamoria to bring

peace and life by giving people and animals laws to live by.

We respect the wisdom of our elders. They hold experience and knowledge of the lands, animals, waters, and our *Sahtuto'ine* language and culture.

We respect the wisdom and teachings of Ehtseo Ayah, the Prophet. He told of our future as Sahtuto'ine. He told of our continuing responsibility the for waters. and animals lands, necessary to our existence. He told of the importance of our language, culture, and spirituality as the source of our strength.

We recognize the importance of all Sahtuto'ine working together: women and men, elders, adults and youth. We maintain our customs, our traditions and our laws. Our traditional knowledge is passed down from elders to the younger generations. We respect and acknowledge our elders. The younger generations carry our hopes for the future of our people.

Our language is strong. We speak the language of the people of the Bear Lake, sometimes called North Slavey.

It is our responsibility to love, respect and protect our traditional lands and the places and life within, according to the teachings of our elders for the benefit of future generations of

Sahtuto'ine.

Treaty 11, signed in 1921 by our ancestors, recognizes our relationship of peace and coexistence with Canada. It recognizes us as the original people of our traditional territories.

Metis Sahtu and The Dene Land Claim Comprehensive Agreement signed 1993 in recognizes our relationship with Canada. It describes rights we have as the original people in our traditional territories.

The Sahtuto'ine maintain our rights and responsibilities as given to us by the Creator, including our right of self-government.

The Sahtuto'ine seek to govern as one people under one institution, the Délînê Got'înê Government.

The Sahtuto'ine have therefore negotiated the Délînê Self-Government agreement with Canada and the Government of the Northwest Territories to establish a unified aboriginal public government at the community level.

The Délînê Got'înê Government is responsible for decision making that is rooted in the history, culture and ways of *Sahtuto'ine*.

The Délînê Got'înê Government is based on openness and the participation of all *Sahtuto'ine*.

The Délînê Got'înê Government will protect the rights, interests, language, culture, traditions, heritage and traditional economy and the responsibilities to the land, of the

Sahtuto'ine.

The Délînê Got'înê Government will recognize and collaborate with other Aboriginal peoples, our non-Aboriginal residents and neighbours and governments.

1. Definitions

1.1 The terms used in this Délînê Got'înê Æædó have the same meaning as in the Final Self-Government Agreement.

2. Status of the Délînê Got'înê Æædó

- 2.1 The laws of the Délînê Got'înê Government shall be consistent with this Délînê Got'înê Æædó and with the Final Self-Government Agreement.
- 2.2 This Délînê Got'înê Æædó and the laws and decisions of the Délînê Got'înê Government are subject to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms.
- 2.3. If there is any conflict between this Délînê Got'înê Æædó and the Selfprovisions of the Final Government Agreement, the the Final Selfprovisions of Government Agreement will prevail to the extent of the conflict.

3. Délînê Got'înê Government

- 3.1 The Délînê First Nation with Canada and the GNWT has negotiated the Final Self-Government Agreement to establish unified aboriginal public government and has chosen to act through Délînê Got'înê the Government to exercise its capacity, rights, powers and privileges and to its duties, functions and carrv obligations.
- 3.2 The Délînê Got'înê Government represents the interests of all: men,

- women, elders and youth. It must respect our Dene culture, language, heritage, traditions and ways and inherent rights and the responsibilities of Délînê First Nation citizens to lands, waters, language, heritage, traditions, economy and way of life.
- 3.3 Délînê Got'înê Government must strive to understand and respect the wisdom of the elders and the of Prophet *Ayah*.
- 3.4 The Délînê Got'înê Government must represent, protect and promote the interests of all residents of the Délînê District.
- 3.5 The members of the Délînê Got'înê Government who are participants under the Sahtu Dene and Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement will, in good faith and with due diligence, manage the lands and assets, and exercise the powers and responsibilities of the Deline participants under the Sahtu Dene Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement for the sole benefit of all Délînê participants and future generations to come.
- 3.6 The Délînê Got'înê Government is composed of the following:
 - a) The ?ehkw'atidé;
 - b) The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ;
- c) The Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ;
- d) The Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ;

e) Other institutions which may be established by the Délînê Got'înê Government.

4. The ?ehkw'atidé

- 4.1 The *?ehkw'atidé* is the leader of the Délînê Got'înê Government and shall be elected by Délînê First Nation citizens for a term not exceeding four years.
- 4.2 The ?ehkw'atidé will understand, respect and practice our Dene culture, heritage, language and traditions and follow the wisdom of our elders and our ancestors.
- 4.3 The *?ehkw'atidé* represents, protects and promotes the interests of our people, and speaks with one voice for all *Sahtuo'tine*.
- 4.4 The ?ehkw'atidé must:
 - (a) be a DFN Citizen;
 - (b) be a resident of Délînê, in accordance with a residency requirement as set out in Délînê Got'înê Government law; and
 - (c) meet a minimum age requirement as set out in Délînê Got'înê Government law.

5. The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ

5.1 The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall consist of eight to twelve voting members, including:

- a) The ?ehkw'atidé, who shall chair the meetings of the Délînê K'aowædó Kæ;
- b) An Æôda Representative appointed by the Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ; and
- c) members at large elected by eligible residents of the Délînê District for a term not exceeding four years.
- 5.2 The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall adopt an elections law including provisions for the size of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ, procedures for elections, including appeal procedures and election of the Land Claim Participants Advisory Council.
- 5.3 Deline Got'înê Government law may require that up to 75% of members of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ, including the *?ehkw'atidé* and the Æôda Representative, be DFN Citizens.
- 5.4 The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall be the legislative body of the Délînê Got'înê Government with responsibility to exercise the jurisdictions and authorities set out in the Délînê Got'înê Æædó and the Délînê Final Self-Government Agreement.
- 5.5 Subject to this Délînê Got'înê Æædó and the Final Self-Government Agreement, the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ may take all such actions as are required to carry out its responsibilities.

- 5.6 The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ may discuss, debate and enact laws in relation to all matters for which the Délînê Got'înê Government has authority pursuant to the Délînê Final Self-Government Agreement and in accordance with this Délînê Got'înê Æædó.
- 5.7 The Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall strive to reach its decisions by consensus and through broad participation and consultation. When consensus cannot be achieved decisions may be made by a majority vote of those present subject to the requirements in Délînê Got'înê Government law.
- 5.8 A member of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall not participate in the discussion or voting on any question on which he or she has a conflict of interest.
- 5.9 At least once per year, the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall report in writing on its activities and those of its institutions.

6. The Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ

- 6.1 The Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ shall be composed of all Délînê First Nation elders.
- 6.2 The Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ may provide advice on any matter to the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ and its institutions.
- 6.3 Following each election of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ, the Délînê Æôda K'áowœ Kœ shall appoint

from among its members an Elders Representative to serve on the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ for the term of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ.

7. The Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ

- 7.1 The Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ shall be composed of three to five members appointed by the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ for a term not to exceed four years.
- 7.2 Members of the Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ shall exercise their judicial functions independently from the other branches of the Délînê Got'înê Government and may only be removed on grounds of incapacity, conviction of an offence under the *Criminal Code* or judicial misconduct.
- 7.3 The Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ shall be responsible for:
 - a) The administration of sanctions for violations of Délînê Got'înê Government laws:
 - b) the administration of alternative dispute measures programs and extra-judicial programs;
 - c) the performance of dispute resolution functions;
 - d) the hearing of appeals or re-hearings in relation to administrative decisions of the Délînê Got'înê Government and institutions made

pursuant to Délînê Got'înê Government laws; and

- e) such other duties and functions assigned to it under Délînê Got'înê Government laws; as authorized by the Final Self-Government Agreement.
- 7.4 Members of the Délînê K'œ Dats'eredi Kœ are expected to have knowledge and understanding of Dene laws and traditions.

8. Beneficiaries Board

- 8.1 A Beneficiaries Board shall be composed of three to five members elected by adult resident and non-resident participants under the Sahtu Dene and Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement who are DFN citizens or entitled to be DFN citizens.
- 8.2 The ?ehkw'atidé and the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ shall work with and receive advice from the Beneficiaries Board on all matters relating to the Sahtu Dene and Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement, including the management of lands and other assets as provided in the Final Self-Government Agreement.

9. Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené

9.1 All Délînê First Nation citizens have the right to attend the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené, and may speak, to ask questions and make

recommendations to the Délînê Got'înê Government.

- 9.2 All residents of the Délînê District may also attend the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené and participate in its deliberations.
- At least once every calendar year, the Délînê Got'înê Government report to the Délînê shall Aénats'ehd£ Dzené and to all residents of the Délînê District on all financial. administrative and operational matters of the Délînê Got'înê Government and of its institutions and shall outline the administrative financial. and operational plans of the Délînê Got'înê Government.
- 9.4 The audited financial statements of the Délînê Got'înê Government and its institutions shall be tabled at the annual meeting of the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené.
- 9.5 The Délînê Got'înê Government shall also provide a written report to Délînê participants at the annual meeting of the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené on the management and administration of assets, lands and responsibilities under the Sahtu Dene and Metis Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement.

10. Citizenship

10.1 The Délînê Got'înê Government shall pass laws which establish criteria and procedures for being a Délînê First Nation citizen.

- 10.2.1 Persons who were, on the Effective Date of the Final Self-Government Agreement, members of the Délînê Land Corporation and of the Délînê First Nation Band, or who were entitled to be members, have the right to be Délînê First Nation citizens.
- 10.2.2 Notwithstanding 10.2.1, a person (1) who has citizenship under another aboriginal self-government agreement or (2) who is on an *Indian Act* band list other than the Deline First Nation band list, is not entitled to be a DFN Citizen.
- 10.3 Délînê First Nation citizens have the right to be consulted by and to participate in the Délînê Got'înê Government as provided in Délînê Got'înê Government laws
- 10.4 Délînê First Nation citizens have the right to good government that is accountable to all and that acts with openness and with integrity and is responsive to the needs of the community.
- 10.5 Délînê First Nation citizens have responsibilities to our public government, to each other, to our neighbours and our community, to our traditions and heritage and to our environment.
- 10.6 Délînê First Nation citizens must work together with the Délînê Got'înê Government, to seek consensus and harmony, and to participate in ensuring effective, accountable and good government for all.

- 10.7 Délînê First Nation citizens must help one another and respect one another. We must work toward the good of the community. We must respect our leaders and the elders and support our youth. We must learn, maintain and speak our language. We must learn, maintain and follow our traditions. We must speak with openness and build our sense of community. We must help one another provide for our needs and share with one another in our bounty.
- 10.8 Délînê First Nation citizens must respect and live in harmony with our environment: the lands, waters, animals and plantlife. We must ensure that these resources are preserved for future generations, to depend upon and to sustain our traditions in the way we have and our ancestors have since time immemorial.

11. Official Languages

The official languages of the 11.1 Got'înê Government are Délînê North Slavey and English. All persons have the riaht communicate with and receive available services from the Délînê Got'înê Government and institutions in either North Slavey or English.

12. Accountability

12.1 The Délînê Got'înê Government, its institutions, officials and representatives have been entrusted to carry out our right of

self-governance and are accountable to the Délînê First Nation citizens and to residents of the Délînê District.

- 12.2 Délînê Got'înê Government shall present an annual report to the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené as set out in this Délînê Got'înê Æædó.
- 12.3 The Délînê Got'înê Government is accountable to all participants in relation to all matters arising from the management and administration of the Sahtu Dene and Métis Comprehensive Land Claim agreement and will report thereon to the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené.
- 12.4 The Délînê Got'înê Government, its institutions, officials and representatives shall exercise all powers and authorities in a manner consistent with this Délînê Got'înê Æædó and Délînê Got'înê Government laws and shall:
 - (a) act with respect and fairness and without discrimination or abuse;
 - (b) strive to consult with and to seek consensus of all Délînê Citizens, particularly in relation to important community decisions;
 - (c) allow for and encourage the full and free expression and participation of all Délînê citizens: and
 - (d) protect our lands, waters and resources, including the

protection and enhancement of all living things.

(e) give priority to teaching and educating Délînê citizens and to capacity building in the community of Délînê.

13. Amendment of Délînê Got'înê Æædó

- 13.1 Notice, including a written explanation of the amendment, must be given to all DFN citizens of any proposed amendment to this Délînê Got'înê Æædó at least 90 days prior to a secret ballot vote to approve or reject such an amendment.
- 13.2 Amendment to this Délînê Got'înê Æædó must be approved by a secret ballot vote of at least 60% of adult DFN citizens who vote provided that at least 25% of all adult DFN citizens participate in such a vote.

14. Amendment of Final Self-Government Agreement

- 14.1 Notice, including a written explanation of the amendment, must be given to all DFN citizens of any proposed amendment to the Final Self-Government Agreement at least 90 days prior to the secret ballot vote to approve or reject such amendment under s. 14.2
- 14.2 Subject to 14.3, any proposed amendment to the Final Self-Government Agreement must be approved by a secret ballot vote of at

least 60% of the adult DFN citizens who vote provided that at least 25% of all adult DFN citizens participate in such a vote.

14.3 Where the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ determines that an amendment the to Final Self-Government Agreement is a minor amendment, such amendment may be approved by decision of the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ, provided that such amendment has previously been reported to a meeting of the Délînê Åénats'ehd£ Dzené which has agreed that such minor amendment can considered and approved by the Délînê K'aowœdó Kœ rather than by a secret ballot vote under 14.2.

NOTE: Pursuant to the Final Self-Government Agreement, on or before the date of the ratification vote for the Final Self-Government Agreement the Délînê Got'înê Æædó is to be approved by the members of the Délînê First Nation Band and of the Délînê Land Corporation.
